Learning a new language like English can be a challenge, but in a regular study, it can be done. Classes are important, but so is the disciplined practice. It might even be fun. Learning any new language is a time-consuming process, more than 300 hours with some ratings. Variety will keep you engaged and make you learn more. Reading English newspapers and books, listening to music or watching TV can also help you improve your written and verbal understanding skills. By doing this repeatedly, you begin to subconsciously absorb things like pronunciation, speech patterns, accents and grammar. Keep your pen and paper handy and write down the words you are reading or unfamiliar. Then do some research to learn what these new words mean. Use them the next time you are in the role-playing dialog class. Non-native English speakers sometimes struggle with a certain word pronunciation because they do not have similar sounds in their native language. You can also write two words very much, but they can be pronounced quite different (for example, rough and though), or there may be combinations of letters where one of them is quiet (e.g. k swag). If you want very little material to work with, ask questions that call a simple yes or no answer. In the more likely case that you'd rather have some interesting quotes, ask open questions that can get your topic talked about, reminiscent or explaining the topic. If you need to ask a yes-or-no question, be prepared for follow-up questions in terms of answers. If you are interviewing a writer, writer, producer, blogger, artist, or other expert who has produced a commercial product such as a film or book, by all means, see a movie or read a book. You need to know what you're dealing with. It's never pleasant to get into asking a question you should know the answer if you'd read up. Another option is to ask your editor, but that doesn't mean they should come up with questions. This is your job to do your job for you.
